



CALL THE POLICE!

THE reshuffle that is in progress in connection with Pirie's police force has become so sweeping that citizens, who accept the service as a matter of course, are taking notice. Important changes have taken or are taking place, including transfer of inspector of the Northern Division, sergeant-incharge, and leading plainclothes man, closure of Piric West Police Station as such, and transfer of several constables.

When the average citizen sets aside the inspector, whose duty it is to cover the whole division, at first glance he has a feeling of surprise on noting that there are 19 officers, including a woman, to watch over law and order in this town of 12,500 souls. More so does that thought arise when, in case of emergency, he calls for a policeman and cannot secure one "on the dot."

BUT the police force, like every other union organisation, works to a system of hours, and, while the men do not enjoy the 40-hour week or the lead price bonus, they have their eight hours a day to put in. For analysis purposes we may eliminate the sergeant-in-charge, who is an administrator (though Pirie's Sgt Merrett works the hours of three men), the plainclothes men who have their enquiry duties, as has also the woman officer, two of the rank and file who do clerical work, and two men who are in charge of suburban stations (or have been), with their many public calls, day and night. Add to those facts the absence on leave almost continuously of two men, a little sick leave here and there, and few are left to maintain patrol of the town over three shifts in the 24 hours.

Escorting silver and gold to train or plane, being on hand when big pays are being handled, and periodic trips to the city with prisoners all cut into the strength of the local force. Final summing-up is that it is under-manned.

MAYBE that is why the commissioner has ordered the closure of Piric West Station, which has done duty with a growing population for about 30 years. Whether that was wise or not only time will tell.

A new inspector has taken over the task of Insp. Bonython. He has come with the knowledge that this town is as efficiently policed as any in Australia-proved not only by comparative absence of serious crime esingular in a scaport with world entrances), but by the few cases which remain unsolved and the swiftness with which the majority are cleaned up. And certainly we are not over-staffed.
