Branch At Pirie Mooted

The first step towards formation of an Apex Club branch in Pirie was made at a meeting at the town hall when Adelaide and Gawler officials and members of the association met a group of young Pirie

Messrs. John Copeland and Bob Parham, former members of the Gawler club and now resident in

Mr. C. L. Davis, M.P. (mayor) attended and welcomed the visitors, who included Messrs. Martin Stark (district governor), Ray Ivan Powys (zone president), Chamberlain (Gawler president), and 10 Gawler Apexians. The mayor gave an assurance of giving all aid possible to the movement.

Mr. Powys addressed the meeting and expounded the aims and ideals of Apex, which began in Geelong in 1930 when three young business men formed a club which was in essence a junior Rotary

Mr. Powys said more than 80 clubs were now united in an Australia-wide association which catered for young men between the ages of 18 and 35.

The movement sought to develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive, and serviceable citizenship, said Mr. Powys, and made the ideal of ser-vice the basis of all endeavor. Apex was altruistic in its apand preferred assisting community schemes rather than aiding individual cases.

Discussion after the address led to the realisation that as Apex had become an asset and a power in other towns and cities, its potential was as great for Pirie. In order to allow possible members a further opportunity of learning the value of Apex and its "service through fellowship," a dinner-meeting was arranged for January 21, with John Copeland and Bob Parham as conveners.

QUEEN Elizabeth will speak by radio to her people in the farthermost points of the British Empire on Christmas Day.

Australians will hear Her Majesty's voice through the national broadcasting stations at 11.30 p.m. on Christmas Night (South Australian time), and the

message will be repeated through all regional stations on Sunday at 3.40 p.m.

DAMAGE BY STORMS

Torrential Rain And Hail Ruin Crops

Freak thunderstorms lashed Adelaide seaside suburbs and country towns yesterday after-noon with hall and torrential causing thousands

pounds' worth of damage. Fruit and vine crops suffered acavily in Adelaide Plains, Barossa

Valley, and mid-North towns. Late wheat and oat crops in Clare district were flattened by storms, and reports of heavy thunderstorms were received from Renmark, and Mt. Burr in the South-East.

A cloudburst at Tarlee caused 21 in. of rain in an hour.

Floodwaters swept over the railway line between Roseworthy and Wasleys, and Gawler trotting track was swamped. The trots, to have been held last night, were postponed until this evening.

At Virginia, hail caused thousands of pounds' worth of damage to glasshouses and crops. panes were shattered and ripe tomatoes, beans, and trombones were cut to pieces.



CHRISTMAS

ONGFELLOW told the story of King Olaf, who, surrounded by his Berserks in a great banqueting hall, called loudly for a song "with a sword in every line." In his wonderful metre the immortal poet described how the Yuletide bells rang while king and courtiers caroused, and as Olaf raised his mighty sword by its blade "On the shining wall a vast and shadowy cross was .cast," whereupon foaming cups of ale were raised "To the Lord!"

The old tale need not be lost on us at this Christmas, 1954. How often do we, sitting on top of the world as we are, call for. something to please the senses, to forget our earthly troubles. to show the world our bold front-finally to experience an undefined something which reminds us, ever so quietly, that there is more to Christmas than an orgy of spending, feasting, giving, and making joyful noise.

At this season the spirit of charity and goodwill, never far from the surface in this industrial city of ours, rises to the top, and for a few brief hours that complete unity of mankind for which the Child Jesus was born and the persecuted Christ died becomes universal. "For a few brief hours" is quoted advisedly, for with the passing of the festive season complacency returns, and we steer for the old rut.

BUT the spirit is only slumbering between Christmases, to awake at the appropriate time. And what causes the awakening? Behind the mind of every man and woman is an inborn knowledge of what this age, those which have passed, and those still to come owe to that humble birth in Bethlehem. The picture of the Manger can never grow commonplace or stale, suspended though it may be above peaceful acknowledgment or rictous

So far as worldly things are concerned Port Pirie has much for which to be thankful at this season—happiness, plenty, and a future that is glowing with promise. Better still, there is an air of goodwill abroad among the citizens-possibly minus some of the finer ethics of recognised Christianity, but none the less sincere. Let it be no empty gesture, then, to take our brother by the hand and wish him well at this Christmastide.

COOKING TO THE RIGHT COLOR



In a textile factory at Langley, in Buckinghamshire, a cradle of spools of woollen yarn is being lowered into one of the stainless steel dye vats to be "cooked" to the right color. This factory, which is perhaps the most modern dye-house in the South of England, claims to process twice as much material with a given quantity of coal as anybody else in the industry. It is one of the few textile factories in Britain with a complete vertical organisation. On a 20-acre site is concentrated a spinning mill, dyeing, finishing, and printing works, knitting mill and making-up plant, producing 3,000 dozen children's knitted garments a day.



POSTAL GROWTH IN PIRIE

"Office Totally Inadequate," Says Mr. Russell

"Although Pirie Post Office is listed for alterations in the Government's programme of works, attention to facilities for both members of the public and staff is long overdue. The building is more than 50 years old and provision for the huge and growing volume of business in this city is totally inadequate," Mr. E. H. D. Russell, M.H.R., said yester-

"Commodious and well-appointed post offices have been opened in Adelaide suburban areas in recent years, and it seems incongruous that Pirie should have had to endure conditions outmoded by the growth of commercial and industrial activity. Residents in pro-vincial areas take greater advan-tage of postal facilities, and that adds to the congestion," Mr. Russell continued.

"The Christmas rush in Pirie has brought the congested conditions at the post office forcibly to notice. Mr. T. J. Cook (postmaster) and members of his staff are to be commended on their courtesy and efficiency in trying circumstances.

"At peak periods this week clerks have been 'flat out' in attending to customers, who have been stand-ing at least six deep in solid masses in front of the restricted counter space. I was also amazed to see 14 young men sorting mails in a small room, which once housed the telephone exchange. There was not even a fan to give relief in stifling summer heat.

CROWDED OFFICE

"The postmaster in Pirie has to attend to his duties at a desk set in the busy general office, which must be most disturbing to him, apart from the lack of privacy.

"Proposed extension of the post office building will give some re-lief to the congested conditions, and I shall urge Sir Philip McBride (acting Postmaster-General) to expedite matters. Mr. S. Fountain (State Director of Posts and Telegraphs) has done his utmost in the circumstances.

"Provision of a clock on the outside of the post office building would be a welcome amenity and I shall enquire whether installation is possible.

"Beside attention to Pirie's requirements, I shall endeavor to secure improvement of postal facilities at other large centres in the division, including Port Lincoln, which handles mails for Eyre Pen-insula," added Mr. Russell.


