

Moon viewers share best pictures of the supermoon





The full moon is 14 per cent bigger and 30 per cent brighter than normal due to the fact that it is 30,000 kilometres closer to earth than usual. It will not reach this close again until 2034.





NASA described Monday's event as an "extra-supermoon" that will also mean stronger high tides.

Astronomers say the best time to spot the moon is when it rises as this is when it will appear larger to the naked eye than it normally does.



In Thailand, astrologers were variously predicting the supermoon would bring disaster or great fortune.

Soraja Nuan-yoo, renowned for predicting the 2004 tsunami that killed many in Thailand and other countries round the Indian Ocean, warned that when the moon gets close to the Earth, "natural disasters happen".
