**UPDATE:** Residents in Ingham are bracing for the worst flood in nearly a decade.

Meanwhile further north, swift-water rescue teams are being sent to Innisfail as heavy rain prompts major flood warnings across the region.

Falls of up to 300mm in parts of the Far North have closed roads and schools and cut off towns across the region.

The heavy rainfalls which have drenched the Far North this week are expected to move north today.

But Bureau of Meteorology forecaster Jim Richardson said Cairns and the surrounding areas would remain wet over the weekend.

"The heavier stuff is generally pushing north. We are still expecting some rainfall to be around the next few days," he said.

"The heavier rain will be mostly north of Cairns by this evening but over the next seven days showers are continuing for that region.

"The main trough is pushing north but it has got south easterlies behind it, so over the whole east coast showers will persist."

Mr Richardson played down fears of a cyclone forming in northern Queensland.

"We have a weak low in the gulf shifting on to land today, but we're not expecting too much development there," he said.

"There may be another system over the weekend but there is a low chance of





**YESTERDAY:** The wet weather causing chaos across the Far North region is expected to continue overnight and tomorrow but will subside over the weekend as the heavy rain trough that came up from Townsville moves further north.

The Bureau of Meteorology has cancelled its previous severe storm warning issued at 2pm for the Tropical North Coast and Tablelands, though showers will persist over the weekend.

Many roads throughout the Tablelands and Cassowary Coast areas remain closed.


# **IMPORTANT INFORMATION**

- Tropical Public Health Services issued a Boil Water alert for the tablelands Regional Council water supply at Millaa Millaa and the Cassowary Coast water supply at Tully and surrounding, due to staff being unable to reach those areas.
- Due to rock slides on the Kuranda Range, the Kuranda Scenic Railway has cancelled afternoon and tomorrow's services.
- Stockland carpark at Earlville is closed due to flooding.

# A MAJOR FLOOD WARNING HAS BEEN ISSUED FOR THE HERBERT RIVER

- A Major Flood Peak similar to February 2009 flood levels is expected at Ingham early Friday morning.
- River levels are expected to reach the major flood level at Ingham Pump Station (14.75 m) early Friday morning.
- $\blacksquare$  The Herbert River at Gairloch is expected to peak around 12.50 metres early Friday morning.
- Sand and sandbags are available for collection at BP Halifax, Carrs Farm at Cordelia and Shire Hall car park Ingham.
- Roads closed in the district include Hawkins Creek at Dalrymple and Bridge and Bosworths Crossing.
- Water over road at Halifax / Gairloch Washaway and the Blue Butterfly Road intersection.
- Residents need to take immediate action to prepare for a major flood event.
- Residents in low lying flood prone areas should enact their household emergency plan





**EARLIER:** Roads have been closed across the Far North as heavy rain continues to fall.

The Bruce Highway at Tully has been closed at Banyan River to all traffic due to flooding.

The Department of Transport and Main Roads closed the road at 11.35am and long delays are expected.


The Gillies Range Road at Lake Barrine / Little Mulgrave has also been closed to all traffic from 12.40pm.

The highway is also closed from Vico Road at Gordonvale, through to Boar Pocket Road on the Yungaburra side of the range.

64mm has been recorded in an hour at Peet's bridge and the main bridge in Ravenshoe flooded.





Other roads closed to all traffic across the Cassowary Coast region include East Feluga Rd, Tully Hull Rd at Silky Oak, Bryant Street at Tully, Cardstone Rd at Dingo Pocket/Jarra Creek, Davidson Rd at Munro Plains, Tully Mission Beach Rd at Birkalla, and East Feluga Rd at East Feluga.

Motorists are reminded not to drive in flood waters.

Further advice will be provided once conditions change.

# **RAINFALL TOTALS**

- Cairns central received 26mm yesterday and 38mm today, totalling 64.
- Tully has received 39mm as of today.
- Cooktown received 65mm yesterday, but only 10mm today, though that is expected to increase as the trough heads north.
- Port Douglas picked up 117mm yesterstday, with widespread falls decreasing today, though still remaining in the strong 50-100mm range.
- A few isolated areas received figures higher, with 132mm hitting Millaa Millaa and Kuranda range which received 182mm

**EARLIER:** Far North Queensland has been warned to brace for flooding across the region as the monsoon kicks into high gear.

Road closures have already taken effect at Tully, Ravenshoe, Mt Peter and the Mulligan Highway Further north, roads are closed all the way from Laura to Coen, with 1500mm water over at Morehead River.

Out west, the Burke Developmental Road from Dunbar Station to Mareeba Shire Council boundary has been closed off due to flooding.



Properties are at flood risk at Innisfall, where the Johnstone River is expected to rise to 6.0 metres by late Thursday morning.

Cassowary Coast Regional Council's Mayor John Kremastos has urged residents of Jordell Street, and the lower end of Corinda, Benwell, Campbell and Donald Street to make immediate flood preparations.



"If possible, move vehicles, outdoor equipment, garbage bins and chemical containers to higher locations," Cr Kremastos advised.

Due to the rain, Tully has closed it's visitor information centre, library and public swimming pool.


Cairns has not received any heavy rainfall warnings.

The Bureau of Meteorology's current outlook calls for rain to intensify with upwards of 90mm on Friday before easing off.

**UPDATE:** FORECASTERS are predicting the chance of several cyclones forming in the Far North during the weekend.

Meteorologist Livio Regano said the low pressure system "probably wouldn't affect weather" in Cairns.

"In the next couple of days' time our models show that a low will form in the Gulf of Carpentaria," he said.

"It will have a moderate chance of forming into a cyclone during the weekend."


He said several lows were off the coast of the Far North today.

"There is a cyclone in Fijian waters, but it won't come towards Australia," he said.

"There's also a low pressure area near Cairns."

He said the bulk of rainfall had fallen along the Cassowary Coast, with rainfall totals above 100mm for the last 24 hours.





"Far North Queensland is the only place without strong wind warnings for south-easterlies, but there's still very heavy rain at the moment," he said.

"There are storm warnings in place, but that's for rainfall."

Mr Regano said the rain would start to ease tomorrow.

"The rain won't pass, but it will ease and you'll return to normal tropical weather with a bit of sun between the rain," he said.

He said Cairns Airport only recorded 26mm of rain overnight.

**EARLIER:** AS the tropical low extending up from Townsville prepares to drop buckets on Cairns, one farmer is staying optimistic.

Smithfield cane farmer John Westaway said he's prepared for the worst.

"Any rain is good for me," he said.

"It's still another month or two before the cane goes up, I'm just hoping some of the farmers out west get it.

As the Far North braces for an expected forecast of up to 80mm over the next two days, it's more than just rain on the horizon.

The Bureau of Meteorology is monitoring two lows building off the Coral Sea and the Gulf of Carpentaria.

At the moment, neither of these troughs are forecast to develop into tropical cyclones.

Emergency Services Minister Craig Crawford said Far North residents should be vigilant all the same.



"I would be very surprised if we don't see a cyclone form in the Gulf," Mr Crawford said.

"It's very difficult to know where but we need people to be vigilant, especially in those areas where they've already had a lot of rainfall."

"There's no ability for water to soak in there, it will run and it will flash flood fast."

Parts of the region have already started feeling the wet.

The causeway at James Creek on Wolfram Road, Dimbulah, was washed away by 200mls of rain yesterday morning.

One driver was nearly washed away attempting to ford the river in his ute.


Mareeba Shire Council created a river pass slightly up stream for 4WDs.



**UPDATE:** The Bureau of Meteorology has issued a thunderstorm warning with possible heavy rain and damaging winds for Cairns tonight as the Far North cyclone threat rises.

The weather bureau is still closely monitoring two lows building off the Coral Sea and the Gulf of Carpentaria.

Forecaster, Nicholas Shera said as the tropical low moved southwest this will bring severe storms to northwest Queensland as well as Cairns.



"Heavy rain and damaging winds are possible and people should keep track of the warnings.

A number of Far North beaches have been closed due to the extreme weather as stinger nets are removed.

Surf Lifesavers have removed stinger nets from Ellis Beach, Palm Cove, Clifton Beach, Trinity Beach and Holloways Beach with Port Douglas and Yorkeys Knob nets to be removed tomorrow.

The Bureau of Meteorology has issued a strong wind warning for Townsville waters today and that will extend north to Cairns tomorrow with 25-30 knots expected.

**EARLIER:** PARTS of the Far North have been hit by more than 300mm of rain in less than 24 hours as the Bureau of Meteorology confirms it is still monitoring two cyclones, one of which could possibly form over the weekend.

Cairns has received 64mm of rain since 9am yesterday morning, but areas south of the city have been drenched, with Davidson Creek near Tully copping 304mm while parts of Innisfail have had 250mm.



🗖 A bridge in Dimbulah on the Atherton Tableland is washed away by flooding.


Forecaster, David Crock said as rain totals continue to rise with more on the way the weather bureau is still closely monitoring two lows building off the coral sea and Gulf of Carpentaria.


He said a strengthening monsoonal trough in the Gulf will cause further heavy rain and showers in the tropics with strong wind warnings expected which will increase the likelihood of a cyclone.

#### WIND WARNING: Stinger nets removed and Far North beaches closed

"There is quite a strong ridge of high pressure to the south pushing up strong south-easterlies," Mr Crock said.

"There is a strong wind warning for Townsville waters today and that will extend north to Cairns tomorrow with 25-30 knots expected."





The bureau confirmed cyclone Hola has formed overnight near Vanuatu but it should move south then southeast, with no risk to Queensland.

With the tropics expected to become more active over this weekend and next, Mr Crock said there was a chance of a cyclone forming in the Gulf this weekend.

"(There is) still a chance of a cyclone forming, particularly the system in the Gulf — there is a moderate chance of it forming over the weekend," Mr Crock said.

The weather bureau will be monitoring the possibility of a cyclone in the Coral Sea next week.

"Keep watching that in the next few days, as models suggest a cyclone forming in the Coral Sea next week but that is now looking less likely," Mr Crocker said.

Heavy showers and the odd storm are expected to continue in Cairns over the






**UPDATE:** The Bureau of Meteorology has warned the tropical low brewing in the Coral Sea could develop into something bigger next week.

With the threat of twin cyclones forming in the Far North, forecaster David Crock said there was a 'very low' likelihood of a cyclone developing out at the spot however there is still uncertainty about the low.

"We'll be keeping an eye on it, our cyclone models provide updates every 12 hours," Mr Crock said.

"We probably won't know much more until the end of the week."



The Bureau of Meteorology has warned the tropical low brewing in the Coral Sea could develop into something bigger next week.

Despite this, Far North Queensland is in for a very wet week as the surge affecting Townsville moves north up the coast.

Rain in the area is likely to peak on Thursday, with widespread falls of 50-100mm and isolated heavy showers of up to 200mm.

While the Coral Sea low brews slowly, all eyes at the moment are on the low brewing over the Gulf of Carpentaria, which is likely to move west toward the Northern Territory in the next two days.

Monsoonal conditions brewing as a result of that low could spread as far as Queensland, though at this point is unlikely to travel below the tip of Cape York.





**EARLIER:** MONSOONAL troughs developing off the Coral Sea and Gulf of Carpentenia have a slim chance of forming cyclones.

According to BoM forecaster Adam Blazak, monsoon activity is intensifying in the Coral Sea, though the size or path of the developing trough will likely not be confirmed until later in the week.

"We're looking at increasing wind and moisture activity out in that area by around the midweek," Mr Blazak said.

"Whenever we get that, it raises the possibility of cyclones forming."

As a result of the trough, torrential rain is expected to hit Townsville starting this Wednesday.

Cairns may fare slightly better, but is nonetheless in for a wet week with showers increasing as the Townsville trough starts to move north in the next few days.

"There are expectations of hit and miss shower activity, looking at around 20-30mm on average in the next three days, but that's at the broad scale," Mr Blazak said.

"Isolated areas could get double or triple that quite quickly."

On Sunday, Cairns received 36mm of rain at the airport, and isolated showers all around.

David Taylor, owner of East Coast weather who correctly predicted the heavy rainfall that hit Townsville last week, said weather modelling pointed to a very high chance of a cyclone forming that could move southwest across the Queensland coast.

Meanwhile, the US Navy's Joint Typhoon Warning Centre is monitoring the

potential cyclone forming west of Fiji, that may move southwest once fully formed later in the week.
